# The Book of Daniel

## **Introduction**

#### **Author**

**Daniel** is as established as the **author**, throughout the contents of the book of **Daniel**. Daniel is told in Daniel 12:4, "**seal the book** until the time of the end", and in verse 9, we read, "Go your way, **Daniel**, for the **words** are closed". **Jesus** also attributes the book's **authorship to Daniel** in the Olivet Discourse (Matthew 24:15, Mark 13:14).

## **Date**

The **dating** of the book of **Daniel** varies from 6<sup>th</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup> century B.C. Liberal critics, who attribute the authorship to the **Maccabeans** in 166 B.C., give the book a **late date**. The purpose of the late dating is denial of the super natural aspect of the book.

Conservative Christians and Jews, who accept the super natural aspect of scripture have no problem with dating the book from 605 to 536 B.C, during the time of Daniel. In Ryrie's introduction to Daniel he dates the writing to be 537 B.C.

#### **The Prophet**

**Daniel,** whose name means "God is my Judge", was a statesman in the court of heathen monarchs. Taken captive as a youth to Babylon by Nebuchadnezzar in 605 B.C., he spent the rest of his long life there as a government official and as a prophet of the true God. In the New Testament, Daniel is identified as a prophet by Jesus. (Matthew 24:15; Mark 13:14).

Since he did not occupy the **prophetic office**, the book of **Daniel** is found in the **third** division of the **Hebrew Bible** known as the "**Writings**," rather than in the **second**, the "**Prophets**." Throughout his life he was **uncompromising** and **faithful** to **his God**.

Daniel was a contemporary of **Jeremiah**, **Ezekiel**, **Joshua**, (the high priest of the restoration), **Ezra**, and **Zerubbabel**.

## **Purpose**

Daniel's ministry was to testify, in his personal life and in his prophecies, to the sovereign power of God. Though in exile, the people of Israel were not deserted by God, and Daniel revealed many details about His plan for their <u>future</u>. He also traced the course of Gentile world powers from his own day to the second coming of the Messiah.
