{Part One}

- 1. Daniel's <u>Prayer</u> for the <u>Restoration of Israel</u> (9:1-19)
 - a. His *Calculation* of <u>Jeremiah's Prophecy</u> (9:1-2)

9 In the first year of Darius the son of Ahasuerus, of Median descent, who was made king over the kingdom of the Chaldeans—

² in the **first year** of his reign, I, **Daniel**, observed in the **books** the <u>number</u> of the <u>years</u> which was *revealed as* the **word** of the LORD to <u>Jeremiah</u> the prophet for the **completion** of the **desolations** of **Jerusalem**, *namely*, <u>seventy years</u>.

b. His *Commitment* to <u>Prayer</u> (9:3)

³ So I gave my attention to the Lord God to seek *Him by* <u>prayer</u> and *supplications*, with *fasting, sackcloth* and *ashes*.

c. His *Confession* of the <u>Sinfulness of Israel</u> (9:4-11)

⁴ I <u>prayed</u> to the LORD my God and <u>confessed</u> and said, "Alas, O Lord, the *great* and *awesome* God, who keeps His covenant and *lovingkindness* for those who love Him and keep His commandments, ⁵ we have <u>sinned</u>, committed <u>iniquity</u>, acted <u>wickedly</u> and <u>rebelled</u>, even turning aside from Your commandments and ordinances.

⁶ Moreover, we have *not listened* to Your servants the prophets, who spoke in Your name to our kings, our princes, our fathers and all the people of the land. ⁷ "Righteousness belongs to You, O Lord, but to us open shame, as it is this day—to the men of Judah, the inhabitants of Jerusalem and all Israel, those who are nearby and those who are far away in all the countries to which You have driven them, because of their unfaithful deeds which they have committed against You.

⁸ Open shame belongs to us, O Lord, to our kings, our princes and our fathers, because we have <u>sinned</u> against You.

⁹ To the Lord our God *belong* compassion and forgiveness, for we have <u>rebelled</u> against Him; ¹⁰ nor have we *obeyed* the voice of the LORD our God, to walk in His teachings which He set before us through His servants the prophets.

¹¹ Indeed all Israel has <u>transgressed</u> Your law and *turned aside*, *not obeying* Your voice; so the <u>curse</u> has been poured out on us, along with the <u>oath</u> which is written in the law of Moses the servant of God, for we have sinned against Him.

d. His *Confirmation* of God's <u>Righteous Judgment</u> (9:12-15)

¹² Thus He has <u>confirmed</u> His words which He had spoken against us and against our rulers who ruled us, to bring on us great <u>calamity</u>; for under the whole heaven there has **not** been done *anything* like what was done to Jerusalem.

¹³ As it is written in the <u>law of Moses</u>, all this <u>calamity</u> has come on us; yet we have <u>not</u> sought the favor of the LORD our God by *turning* from our iniquity and giving *attention* to Your truth.

¹⁴ Therefore the LORD has kept the <u>calamity</u> in store and brought it on us; for the LORD our God is <u>righteous</u> with respect to all His deeds which He has done, but we have <u>not obeyed</u> His voice.

¹⁵ "And now, **O Lord our God**, who have brought Your people out of the land of **Egypt** with a mighty hand and have made *a name* for **Yourself**, as it is this day—we have *sinned*, we have been *wicked*.

e. His *Compassionate* Plea for the <u>Restoration</u> of Israel (9:16-19)

¹⁶ O Lord, in *accordance* with *all* Your righteous acts, let now *Your* anger and *Your* wrath <u>turn away</u> from *Your* city Jerusalem, *Your* holy mountain; for *because* of our sins and the iniquities of our fathers, Jerusalem and *Your* people *have become* a reproach to all those around us.

¹⁷ So now, **our God**, <u>listen</u> to the <u>prayer</u> of **Your servant** and to his **supplications**, and for <u>Your sake</u>, O Lord, let **Your face shine** on **Your desolate sanctuary**.

¹⁸ O my God, incline Your ear and *hear*! Open Your eyes and see our *desolations* and the city which is called by Your name; for we are <u>not</u> presenting our supplications before You on *account* of <u>any merits</u> of our own, but on *account* of Your great <u>compassion</u>.

¹⁹ O Lord, *hear!* O Lord, *forgive!* O Lord, *listen* and *take action*! For <u>Your own sake</u>, O my God, do not delay, because Your city and Your people are called by Your name."

Daniel's **"Affective" Prayer**... Key <u>Observations</u> for *Application*

 Daniel was prompted to *pray* because he was looking at Jeremiah's <u>prophecy</u>, and saw that the number of years (70years) concerning the desolations of Jerusalem were at a completion (9:1-2). He *prayed* and *petitioned* God on the <u>basis</u> of His prophetic <u>promise</u>. (Jer. 25:11-12, 29:10)

As we pray, we too can *petition* God on the <u>basis</u> of His prophetic <u>promises</u> and the <u>truths</u> contained in <u>His word</u>.

Let's hold firmly to the **confession** of <u>our hope</u> without wavering, for **He** who <u>promised</u> is *faithful*; (Hebrews 10:23)

2. Daniel made a personal <u>commitment</u> to spend time in *prayer* to the Lord God. In preparation for *prayer*, he fasted and humbled himself (9:3).

As we pray and *petition* God, we too must take *time* to <u>fully focus</u> our attention on Him, and <u>humble</u> our hearts before Him.

For **My hand made** all these *things*, So all these *things* came into being," declares the LORD. "But I will look to *this* one, At one who is <u>humble</u> and <u>contrite</u> in **spirit**, and who trembles at **My word**. (Isaiah 66:2)

3. Daniel began his *prayer* with <u>praise</u> to God, proclaiming His *greatness*, His *faithfulness*, and His *lovingkindness*. He also <u>praised</u> the <u>Lord</u> for His *righteousness*, *compassion*, and *forgiveness* (9:4, 7, 9).

As we pray and *petition* God, we also should begin by <u>praising</u> and <u>glorifying</u> Him for the great and loving God that He is, and for the multitude of blessings He has bestowed on us.

Ascribe to the LORD, sons of the mighty, Ascribe to the LORD glory and strength. Ascribe to the LORD the glory due His name; Worship the LORD in holy attire. (Psalm 29:1)

4. **Daniel's** *prayer* consisted of a **heartfelt**, **detailed** <u>confession</u> of **Israel's** sins that brought about **God's** righteous judgment upon them. Daniel <u>confessed</u> that:

Israel had <u>sinned</u>, committed <u>iniquity</u>, acted <u>wickedly</u> and <u>rebelled</u> (9:5a), *Israel* had <u>turned aside</u> from God's commandments and ordinances,(9:5b), *Israel* had <u>not listened</u> to the prophets, who spoke to all the people (9:6) *Israel* had been openly <u>shameful</u> (9:7a,8), *Israel* had been scattered among the nations because of their unfaithful deeds (9:7b),

Israel had been <u>scattered</u> among the nations because of their <u>unfaithful deeds</u> (9:7b), *Israel* had <u>not obeyed</u> the voice and teachings of the Lord through His prophets (9:10), *Israel* had <u>transgressed</u> God's law, and a <u>curse</u> had been "poured out" upon them (9:11).

As we pray, it is vital that we spend time <u>confessing</u> our sins before God, seeking His forgiveness, and acknowledging our need for <u>repentance</u> before Him. <u>Confession</u> of sins, whether it be on behalf of an *individual* or a *nation*, has been a key characteristic of many of the <u>affective prayers</u> and *petitions* we see in the Bible. (Ezra 9:5-15) (Nehemiah 1:6-7) (Psalm 51) (Matthew 6:12)

5. Daniel in his prayer acknowledged that God was <u>righteous</u> in bringing judgment and "calamity" upon Israel. For He had warned them (Israel), through the prophets and in the law what would happen if they did not turn from their iniquity, and had continued in their sin (9:12-15). (Jer. 44:2-6)

As we pray, it is important to **acknowledge** that **God** is <u>righteous</u> in **all His judgments.** As **His children**, and like **He** did with **Israel**, **God** may choose to "discipline" us for a season through *trials* and *suffering*, that we might learn obedience and the way of <u>righteousness</u>. (I Peter 5:10) (Hebrews 12:7-11)

- 6. **Daniel's** *prayerful* **appeal** to **God** for <u>Israel's restoration</u> was **based** on a number of **reasons**→
 - → He knew from prophetic <u>scripture</u> that the 70 year judgment was almost <u>complete</u> (9:1-2)
 - → He appealed to God to restore *His* people, *His* sanctuary, and *His* city Jerusalem for <u>His name's sake</u> (9:17-19).
 - → He appealed to God, knowing that Israel merited nothing, but on the basis to God's great <u>compassion</u> (9:18).

Closing Quote

"If <u>prayer</u> to God can be called <u>persuasive</u>, Daniel's prayer certainly merits this description. Daniel, in his holy life, his careful preparation in approaching God, his uncompromising confession of sin, and his appeal to God's holy character as the One who is both *righteous* and *merciful*, illustrates the *kind* of prayer God <u>delights to answer</u>. Daniel, led by the Spirit of God, had expressed precisely the prayer that God had wanted to <u>hear</u> and wanted to <u>answer</u>." (John F. Walvoord)
