A. The *Pronouncement* of **Judah's** time of **Comfort** (40:1-11)

40 "Comfort, O comfort My people," says your God.

² "Speak kindly to Jerusalem; and call out to her, that her warfare has ended, That her iniquity has been removed, That she has received of the LORD's hand double for all her sins."

³ A <u>voice</u> is calling, "Clear the way for the LORD in the wilderness; Make *smooth* in the desert a highway for our God.

⁴ "Let every valley be *lifted up*, and every mountain and hill be made low, and let the rough ground become a plain, and the rugged terrain a broad valley;

5 Then the <u>glory</u> of the <u>LORD</u> will be <u>revealed</u>, and <u>all flesh</u> will <u>see</u> it together; for the <u>mouth</u> of the <u>LORD</u> has <u>spoken</u>."

⁶ A *voice* says, "Call out." Then **he** answered, "*What* shall I call out?"

All flesh is grass, and all its loveliness is like the flower of the field.

⁷The **grass** *withers*, the **flower** *fades*, When the **breath** of **the Lord** blows upon it; Surely the **people** are *grass*.

⁸ The **grass** *withers*, the **flower** *fades*, but the **word** of **our God stands** *forever*.

⁹ Get yourself up on a high mountain, O Zion, bearer of good news, Lift up your voice mightily,

O Jerusalem, bearer of *good news*; lift *it* up, do not fear.

Say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!"

¹⁰ Behold, the **Lord GoD** will **come with** <u>might</u>, With *His arm* ruling for Him.

Behold, **His reward** is **with Him** and **His recompense** before **Him**.

¹¹ Like a <u>shepherd</u> He will *tend* His flock, In His arm He will *gather* the lambs

and carry them in His bosom; He will gently lead the nursing ewes.

The New Testament Connection— Words of Isaiah affirmed in the New Testament

1. *Isaiah's* declaration of comfort, peace, and the <u>removal</u> of Israel's i<u>niquity</u> (40:2) are also affirmed in *New Testament* scripture.

For I do not want you, **brethren**, to be uninformed of this **mystery**—
so that you will not be **wise** in your **own estimation**—
that a **partial** <u>hardening</u> has happened to <u>Israel</u>
until the **fullness** of the **Gentiles** has **come in**;

and so all Israel will be saved; just as it is written,

"THE **DELIVERER** WILL COME FROM **ZION**, **HE** WILL **REMOVE UNGODLINESS** FROM **JACOB**."

"This is **My covenant** with them, When **I take away their sins**." (Romans 11:25-27)

2. Isaiah declared that "a voice" is calling, commanding that a "way" in the wilderness be cleared, and a "highway" in the desert be made smooth in preparation for the coming of the LORD. This "voice" also, using various landscape features, described how that Israel needed to repent, and be "smoothed out" spiritually before the revealing of the glory of the LORD (40:4-5).

In the *New Testament*, this <u>voice</u> is said to be that of **John the Prophet**, who came as a **forerunner** of the **Messiah**, and **testified** of **His coming**. **John** proclaimed and ministered a **baptism** of <u>repentance</u>—a "clearing away" of **one's sin** in **preparation** of the **Lord's coming**. All <u>four</u> New Testament gospel writers proclaimed **John** as this first "voice" in Isaiah's text tonight. (Matthew 3:3, Mark 1:3, Luke 23:4-6, John 1:23)

Now in those days **John the Baptist** came, **preaching** in the **wilderness** of **Judea**, saying, "**Repent**, for the **kingdom of heaven** is at hand."

For this is **the one** referred to by **Isaiah the prophet** when he said,

"THE <u>VOICE</u> OF ONE CRYING IN THE <u>WILDERNESS</u>,

'MAKE READY THE <u>WAY</u> OF THE LORD,

MAKE HIS <u>PATHS</u> STRAIGHT!" (Matthew 3:1-3)

3. In response to a "second" voice, *Isaiah* describes a "third" voice declaring that "<u>all flesh</u> is grass," and *withers* when the breath of the LORD blows upon it (40:6-7). The prophet then <u>contrasts</u> the *perishable* nature of <u>all flesh</u> (humanity) with the *imperishable* nature of the word of God (40:8).

In the *New Testament* Peter quotes these verses in *Isaiah* in describing how that the spiritual *birth* of believers was brought about through the *imperishable* "seed" of the <u>word of God</u> (I Peter 1:23-24).

...for you have been **born again <u>not</u>** of **seed** which is **perishable** but **imperishable**, that is, **through** the **living** and **enduring** <u>word of God</u>. For,

"ALL FLESH IS LIKE GRASS,
AND ALL ITS GLORY LIKE THE FLOWER OF GRASS.
THE GRASS WITHERS, AND THE FLOWER FALLS OFF,
BUT THE WORD OF THE LORD ENDURES FOREVER."

And this is **the <u>word</u>** which was *preached* **to you** (I Peter 1:23-25).

- 4. *Isaiah* describes the **coming** of **the Lord** in *two* ways:
- 1) Behold, the **Lord God** will come with **might**, with **His arm** *ruling* for **Him**. (40:10)

2) Like a shepherd He will tend His flock, In His arm He will gather the lambs and carry them in His bosom; He will gently lead the nursing ewes (40:11)

In the *New Testament*, the **first** and **second coming** of the **Lord** are also **contrasted** this way. During the **first coming** of **Jesus the Messiah**, **He** came as the **good Shepherd** who **gathered** and **tended His sheep** (40:11).

"I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd lays down His life for the sheep...

I (Jesus) have other sheep, which are not of this fold (the Gentiles);
I must bring them also, and they will hear *My voice*; and they will become one flock with one shepherd." (John 10:11, 16)

Also, in the *New Testament*, when **Messiah returns**, **He** will indeed "come with <u>might</u>," and with "<u>recompense</u>," and rule the *arm* of the Lord (40:10).

"But immediately after the **tribulation** of **those days**... the **powers** of the **heavens** will be **shaken**.

And then the **sign** of the **Son of Man** will **appear** in the **sky**, and then **all** the **tribes** of the **earth** will **mourn**, and they will see the **Son of Man coming** ON THE **clouds of THE SKY** with **power** and **great glory** (Matthew 24:29-31)."

Personal Application Like **Israel**, **God** has given us *Comfort*

A. The *Comfort* of His spiritual <u>Presence</u>

And I (Jesus) will pray the Father, and he shall give you another <u>Comforter</u>, that he may <u>abide</u> with you forever; even the <u>Spirit of truth</u>...

I will not leave you comfortless: I will come to you ;..(John 14:16-17a, 18)

. B. The *Comfort* promised us in our <u>Afflictions</u>

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus the Messiah, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction so that we will be able to comfort those who are in any affliction with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God (II Corinthians 1:3-4).

C. The *Comfort* of an **enduring** <u>Hope</u>

Now may our **Lord Jesus the Messiah Himself** and **God our Father**, who has *loved us* and given us *eternal* <u>comfort</u> and <u>good</u> <u>hope</u> by *grace*,

<u>comfort</u> and <u>strengthen your hearts</u> in every <u>good work</u> and <u>word</u> (II Thessalonians 2:16-17).

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
