2 When **He (Jesus)** had come back to **Capernaum** several days afterward, it was *heard* that **He** was at **home**.

² And <u>many</u> were gathered together, so that there was no longer room, not even near the door; and He was speaking the <u>word</u> to them.

³ And they came, bringing to **Him** a **paralytic**, **carried** by **four men.**

⁴ Being *unable* to **get to Him** because of the **crowd**, they **removed** the **roof** *above* **Him**; and when they had **dug an opening**, they **let down** the **pallet** on which the **paralytic** was lying.

⁵ And **Jesus** seeing their <u>faith</u> said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

⁶ But some of the **scribes** were sitting there and **reasoning** in their *hearts*,

7 "Why does this man speak that way? He is blaspheming; who can forgive sins but God alone?"

8 Immediately Jesus, aware in His spirit that they were reasoning that way within themselves, said to them, "Why are you reasoning about these things in your hearts? ⁹ Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are <u>forgiven</u>'; or to say, 'Get up, and pick up your pallet and walk'?

¹⁰ But so that you may know that the <u>Son of Man</u> has authority on earth to forgive sins"—He said to the paralytic,

¹¹ "I say to you, get up, pick up your pallet and go home."

¹² And he **got up** and *immediately* **picked up** the **pallet** and **went out** in the **sight** of **everyone**,

so that they were **all amazed** and were **glorifying <u>God</u>**, saying, "We have **never seen** anything like this."

Reflecting on the **Healing** of the **Paralytic** (2:1-12) **Summary** Outline & Observations

A. The *Pressing* Crowd of People

When **He (Jesus)** had come back to **Capernaum**... it was heard that **He was at home**.

And <u>many</u> were gathered together, so that there was <u>no longer room</u>, **not** even near **the door**; and **He** was speaking **the word** to them. (2:1-2)

B. The *Persistent* <u>Faith</u> of the **four men**, and the <u>Faith</u> of the **paralyzed man**

Being unable to get to Him (Jesus) because of the crowd, they <u>removed</u> the <u>roof</u> above Him; and when they had <u>dug</u> an opening, they let down the pallet on which the paralytic was lying.

And Jesus seeing their faith...(2:4-5a)

C. The *Priority* of <u>Forgiveness</u> of <u>Sin</u> in the *process* of <u>Healing</u>

And **Jesus seeing their faith** said to the **paralytic**, "**Son**, your <u>sins</u> are <u>forgiven</u>."(2:5)

D. The *Protest* of the <u>Scribes</u>

But some of the scribes were sitting there and reasoning in their hearts,

"Why does this man speak that way? He is blaspheming; who can forgive sins but God alone?"(2:6-7)

E. The *Pointed* Response from the Messiah

Which is **easier**, to <u>say</u> to the **paralytic**, 'Your sins are forgiven'; or to <u>say</u>, '<u>Get up</u>, and <u>pick up</u> your **pallet** and <u>walk</u>'? (2:9)

F. The *Powerful* Healing

But so that **you may know** that the **Son of Man** has **authority** on earth to **forgive sins**"—**He said** to the **paralytic**,

"I say to you, get up, pick up your pallet and go home."

And he got up and immediately picked up the pallet and went out in the sight of everyone,..(2:10-12a)

G. The *Praise* and **Amazement** of the **People**

...they (the crowd) were all <u>amazed</u> and were <u>glorifying God</u>, saying, "We have *never seen* anything like this."(2:12b)

Teaching Points—Mark 2:1-12

<u>Point 1</u> \rightarrow God responds to <u>faith</u>. As we read tonight, **He** also "sees" our <u>faith</u>, and **takes note** of *those* who demonstrate *extraordinary* <u>faith</u> <u>in Him</u>, as they face severe and seemingly hopeless circumstances. (2:5)

And without <u>faith</u> it is impossible to please *Him*, for he who comes to God must <u>believe</u> that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him. (Hebrews 11:6)

<u>Point 2</u>→ <u>Before</u> healing the paralytic *physically*, Jesus, having seen the man's faith, declared to him that his sins were <u>forgiven</u> (2:5). Jesus prioritized the need for *spiritual* <u>healing</u>; the need for <u>forgiveness</u>, and a <u>reconciled relationship</u> with God, before healing the man *physically*.

Jesus taught concerning the kingdom of God, and preached <u>repentance</u> and <u>faith</u> in the **gospel** (1:15). **His primary** *mission* on earth was to bring about "redemption through **His blood**, the <u>forgiveness</u> of *our* <u>trespasses</u>,.." (Ephesians 1:7)

";...just as the **Son of Man** did **not** come to **be served**, but **to serve**, and to **give His life** a **ransom** for **many**." (Matthew 20:28)

<u>Point 3</u>→ Our teaching tonight is a **strong testimony** of the <u>divine Person</u> and <u>Authority</u> of <u>Jesus</u>. When <u>Jesus</u> declared that the <u>paralyzed man</u> was <u>forgiven</u> of <u>His sins</u>, <u>He</u> was <u>challenged</u> and <u>accused</u> by the <u>scribes</u>, for <u>only God</u> could <u>forgive sins</u> (2:2:6-7).

Also, according to **Jewish beliefs** at this time, one could <u>not</u> be healed *unless* his sins were forgiven:

"But this other **Jewish idea** was even more **deeply rooted**, had more of **underlying truth**, and would, especially in the felt holiness of Jesus, have a deep **influence** on the **soul**, that **recovery** would **not** be granted to **the sick** unless his **sins** had **first** been **forgiven him**."

(The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah, pg. 504)

So when **Jesus** *both* **forgave** this man, and then had the **power** to **heal him**, it demonstrated both **His** *Divine* **Person** and **Authority**. **Mark** also declared **Jesus** to be the **Jewish Messiah** when he gave **Him** the designation, the "**Son of Man**." (2:9-11)
