Oye, I'm turning **70**... The **Glories** of becoming *Older*

→ *Old Age* (with God's help) can still retain <u>health</u> and <u>vigor</u>

Although **Moses** was **one hundred and twenty years old** when he died, his **eye was not** *dim*, nor his *vigor* **abated**. (Deuteronomy 34:7)

Do you *not* know? Have you *not* heard? The Everlasting God, the LORD, the Creator of the ends of the earth does <u>not</u> become *weary* or *tired.* His understanding is inscrutable.

> He gives <u>strength</u> to the *weary,* And to *him who lacks might* He increases <u>power</u>.

> > Though youths grow *weary* and *tired,* and *vigorous* young men *stumble* badly,

Yet <u>those</u> who *wait* for the LORD will gain <u>new strength;</u> they will *mount up with* wings like **eagles**,

They will *run* and *not* get tired, They will *walk* and *not* become weary. (Isaiah 40:28-31)

→ With *Old Age* comes **grey hair**, which is to be **esteemed**

A gray head is a crown of <u>glory</u>; It is found in the way of *righteousness*. (Proverbs 16:21)

The **glory** of **young men** is their **strength**, and the **honor** of <u>old men</u> is their <u>gray hair</u>. (Proverbs 20:29)

→ With *Old Age* comes <u>wisdom</u>...but not always

"<u>Wisdom</u> is with <u>aged</u> men, With <u>long life</u> is *understanding*. (Job 12:12)

So Elihu the son of Barachel the Buzite spoke out and said,

"I am *young* in years and you (Job) are old; therefore I was **shy** and **afraid** to tell you what I **think**.

"I thought *age* should **speak**, and *increased years* should teach <u>wisdom</u>.

"But it is a *spirit* in man, and the *breath* of the Almighty <u>gives</u> them *understanding*.

"The **abundant** *in years* may <u>not</u> be wise, <u>Nor</u> may *elders* understand *justice.* (Job 32:6-9)

Planted <u>in</u> the house of the LORD, They will *flourish* in the courts of our God.

They will still <u>yield fruit</u> in <u>old age</u>; They shall be full of **sap** and **very green**,.. (Psalm 92:12-14)

Do **not** cast me off in the time of **old age**; Do **not** forsake me when my **strength fails**...

O God, You have *taught me* from my youth, and I still declare Your wondrous deeds.

And even when *I am* <u>old and gray</u>, O God, do *not* forsake me, <u>Until</u> I <u>declare</u> Your *strength* to *this* generation, Your *power* to all who are to come. (Psalm 71:9, 17-18)

> Even to *your* <u>old age</u> I shall be the same, and even to *your* <u>graving years</u> I shall *bear you!*

I have done *it*, and I shall *carry* you; and I shall *bear* you and I shall *deliver* you. (Isaiah 46:4)

→ Old Age yields the Blessings of Children and <u>Grandchildren</u>

Grandchildren are the <u>crown</u> of <u>old men</u>, and the glory of sons <u>is</u> their fathers. (Proverbs 17:6)

→ With *Old Age* comes the important **responsibility** of **modeling** and **teaching** <u>Godliness</u> to the <u>Young</u>

<u>Older men</u> are to be **temperate**, **dignified**, **sensible**, **sound in faith**, **in love**, **in perseverance**.

<u>Older women</u> likewise are to be **reverent** in their behavior, **not** malicious gossips.., <u>teaching</u> what is good,

so that they may **encourage** the **young women** to **love their husbands**, to **love their children**, *to be* **sensible**, **pure**, **workers at home**, **kind**, being **subject** to their **own husbands**, so that the **word of God** will <u>not</u> be **dishonored**. (Titus 2:2-5)
