## The Book of Romans

  - C. He *Informs* them that they have "<u>Died</u>" to <u>the Law</u> through the Body of Messiah (7:1-13)

## D. He *Illustrates* his **Personal** *Struggle* with the <u>Law</u> and <u>Indwelling Sin</u> in the **Flesh** (7:14-25)

1. Revealing His Struggle in Keeping the Law (7:14-17)

<sup>14</sup> For we know that the <u>Law</u> is <u>spiritual</u>, but I am of <u>flesh</u>, <u>sold</u> into <u>bondage</u> to sin.

<sup>15</sup> For what I am **doing**, I do not **understand**; for I am **not practicing** what I *would* **like to** *do*, but I am **doing** the very thing I hate.

<sup>16</sup> But if I **do** the very thing I **do not want** *to do*, I **agree** with the **Law**, *confessing* that the **Law is good**.

<sup>17</sup> So now, **no longer** am I the one doing it, but <u>sin</u> which *dwells* <u>in me</u>.

2. **Recognizing His Struggle** is with **Indwelling Sin** (7:18-20)

<sup>18</sup> For I know that <u>nothing good</u> dwells in me, that is, in <u>my flesh;</u> for the *willing* is **present in me**, but the *doing* of the **good** *is* **not**.

<sup>19</sup> For the *good* that I want, I do <u>not</u> do, but I practice the very evil that I do not want.

<sup>20</sup> But if I am *doing* the very thing I do <u>not</u> want, I am no longer the one doing it, but sin which dwells in me.

3. Realizing His Conflict is between two opposing "Laws" (7:21-23)

<sup>21</sup> I find then the <u>principle</u> that **evil** is **present** <u>in me</u>, the **one** who **wants to do good**.

<sup>22</sup> For I joyfully concur with the law of God in the inner man,

but I see a different <u>law</u> in the members of my <u>body</u>, waging war against the <u>law</u> of my <u>mind</u> and making me a prisoner of the law of sin which is in my members.

<sup>24</sup> Wretched man that I am!
Who will set me <u>free</u> from the body of this *death*?

<sup>25</sup> Thanks be to God through Jesus the Messiah our Lord!
So then, on the one hand *I myself* with my *mind* am <u>serving</u> the <u>law of God</u>, but on the other, with my *flesh* the <u>law of sin</u>.

## Personal Application

- 1. In tonight's text, **Paul** declared that the **Law** is "spiritual." The **Law** comes from **God** who is **Spirit**, and expresses **God's will** for the **behavior of man**. In **contrast Paul** revealed that **he** was "of flesh," and "sold into bondage to sin" (7:14).
  - Although **he** had been <u>freed</u> from sin through Messiah (6:18), Paul was still "of flesh," and as **he** had shared earlier, *struggled* with <u>indwelling sin</u> in the "members" of his body (6:5-11). In our text tonight, **he** details his **inward** *struggle* with the <u>Law</u>, and indwelling <u>sin</u> in his flesh (7:15-24).
- 2. Paul revealed a *struggle* within himself. He was not practicing what he would like to do, but instead, he was doing the very thing he 'hated." He recognized that if He was doing the very thing that he did not want to do, that this in itself was evidence of a personal belief that the <u>Law</u> was good. He resolved that his *struggle* was between his desire to <u>do</u> good, and <u>indwelling sin</u> (7:15-17).

As **believers**, **we too** are "**of flesh**," and have a *struggle* with <u>indwelling sin</u>. Like **Paul**, **we too** can find ourselves **confused** by **thoughts** and **desires** that **we** know are <u>not</u> the **will of God**. **We** even may "**do**" that which we "**do** <u>not</u> want to do." As a result, **we too** can conclude that the **source** of our *struggle* is with "<u>sin</u> in the flesh." (7:15-17)

3. **Paul** acknowledged that in **his flesh** dwelled "**nothing good**." At times **he** was "willing," but **not able** to **do** the **good** that **he wanted** (7:18). Once again **he** concluded that this **inward** *struggle* is due to **sin** which "**dwelled**" in him (7:19-20).

At this point, **Paul** declares this **principle**:

"...that <u>evil</u> is *present* in me, the **one** who **wants** to **do** <u>good</u> (7:21)."

He recognizes that there is a *struggle* within himself to "serve" <u>two</u> existing "laws." With his <u>mind</u>, he "joyfully" <u>concurs</u> inwardly with the <u>law</u> of God (7:22).

However, **Paul** sees a **different "law"** (**law of sin**) in the **members** of his **body**, "**waging war"** against the "**law"** of **his <u>mind</u>**, that makes him a "**prisoner"** of the "**law of sin"** in his **bodily members** (7:23).

As **believers**, we readily agree with the <u>principle</u> that "evil is present" in the one who wants to **do good** (7:21). We also *struggle* inwardly with <u>two</u> existing, but contrary influences (laws). With our mind, our "inner man," we seek to **do** the will of God. However we also face a "different" law which "wages war" against us inwardly, in an attempt to *imprison* us to a "law of sin" in the flesh (7:23-24).

**Beloved**, I urge you as **aliens** and **strangers** to **abstain** from **fleshly lusts** which **wage war** against the **soul**. (I Peter 2:11)

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But I say, walk by the <u>Spirit</u>, and you will not carry out the <u>desire of the <u>flesh</u>.</u>

For the **flesh** sets its **desire against** the **Spirit**, and the **Spirit against** the **flesh**; for these are in **opposition** to **one another**, so that **you** may **not do** the **things** that **you please**. (Galatians 5:16-17)

4. Having described his *struggle* with **sin** in **his flesh**, **Paul** declared in **frustration** how he longed to be **delivered** from "the **body** of this **death**" (7:24).

He then gave thanks to God through Jesus the Messiah. Paul concluded that in Messiah he was now free to choose. With his mind he could serve the law of God.

On the other hand, **he** could **choose** to **serve** the <u>law of sin</u> that resided in **his flesh** (his **carnal nature**) (7:25).

As believers, we too can suffer inward frustration as we seek to serve the Lord, and walk according to His will. However, we too have a *choice*, for we are no longer in bondage to sin, having "died to sin" through the body of Messiah (6:2-6).

Not only that, but **we** have the **presence** and **power** of the **Holy Spirit**, who gives "**life** to our **mortal bodies**," and helps us "**put to** *death* the <u>deeds</u> of the **body**" (8:11-13).

## **Closing Comments**

Help! "I am of flesh, sold into *bondage* to sin (7:14)."

Thankfully, Someone <u>redeemed us</u>, and <u>freed us</u> from this *bondage* 

...and having been <u>freed from sin</u>, you became <u>slaves of righteousness</u>. (Romans 6:18)

In **Him (Jesus) we** have <u>redemption</u> through <u>His blood</u>, the **forgiveness** of our **trespasses**, according to the **riches** of **His grace** (Ephesians 1:7)

;..knowing that **you** were **not** <u>redeemed</u> with **perishable things** like **silver** or **gold** from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers,

but with <u>precious blood</u>, as of a <u>lamb unblemished</u> and <u>spotless</u>, *the blood* of <u>Messiah</u>. (I Peter 1:18-19)

For we know that the **whole creation** *groans* and *suffers* the **pains of childbirth** together until now.

And not only this, but also we ourselves, having the first fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting eagerly for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our body. (Romans 8:22-23)
