The **Feast** of *Sukkot*

Personal Reflections

A. *Sukkot* is a time to **be** <u>Joyful</u>. During the **week of Sukkot** we are **commanded** to be **joyful**, and to **celebrate**. Being **joyful** is a *priority* during this **feast**, as well as being a continual exhortation in **scripture** to **God's people**:

You will make known to me the path of life; In Your presence is *fullness* of <u>joy</u>; In Your right hand there are pleasures forever. (Psalm 16:11)

Then **he (Nehemiah)** said to them (the **people**), "Go, *eat* of the **fat**, *drink* of the **sweet**, and **send portions** to him who has nothing prepared; or this day is *holy* to our Lord. Do <u>not</u> be *grieved*, for the **joy** of **the LORD** is **your strength**." (Nehemiah 8:10)

A joyful heart is good medicine, But a broken spirit *dries up* the bones. (Proverbs 17:22)

<u>Rejoice</u> always; pray without ceasing; in everything give thanks; for this is **God's will** for you in **Messiah Jesus**. (I Thessalonians. (5:16-18)

Now may the **God of** *hope* fill you with <u>all joy</u> and peace in *believing*, so that you will **abound in** *hope* by the **power** of the **Holy Spirit**. (Romans 15:13)

B. *Sukkot* is a time to be <u>Thankful</u>. Throughout **each day** of this feast the sons of **Israel presented offerings** by **fire** to **the Lord.** As per **God's command**, They built "**sukkahs**" and **dwelled** in them as a **reminder** of **God's faithful** *presence* and *provision* when they **came out** of the land of Egypt (Lev. 23:39-44)

In **Israel**, **Sukkot** was **celebrated after** they had **gathered in** the **final crops** of the **fall season**. It was a time to **give <u>thanks</u>** for **God's bountiful <u>blessings</u>**, and **faithful <u>provision</u>** for them.

It is **good** to **give thanks** to **the LORD**And to **sing** *praises* to **Your name**, **O Most High**;

To declare Your *lovingkindness* in the morning and Your *faithfulness* by night,...

For **You**, **O LORD**, have made me **glad** by what **You have done**, I will **sing for joy** at the **works** of **Your hands**. (Psalm 92:1-4)

For us at Adat, **Sukkot** is a refreshing **reminder** of **God's faithful provision** for us. **God** has continued to **provide** for **us** both **personally**, and as a **congregation** year after year. And just as **Israel** offered **sacrifices** on **Sukkot**, let us also offer *spiritual* **sacrifices** of **praise** and **thanks** to our **faithful God** and **Savior**. In **Hebrews** we read:

Through **Him (Jesus)** then, let us continually *offer up* a <u>sacrifice</u> of praise to God, that is, the <u>fruit of lips</u> that <u>give thanks</u> to **His name**. (Hebrews 13:15)

C. Sukkot is a time to be <u>Hopeful</u>. As we just read, the Feast of Sukkot was preceded by the *final* ingathering of crops during Israel's harvest season. Because the feast days have historically pointed to events on God's "prophetic" calendar, we believe that Sukkot points to the future "spiritual" <u>harvest</u> of Israel's remnant that will be "gathered" in the land, and <u>saved</u> when the Lord <u>returns</u> at end of the age. This will culminate with a marvelous Sukkot celebrated by <u>all</u> nations, as God establishes the *kingdom* promised to Israel (Zechariah 13 &14).

We believe that Israel's re-establishment as a nation in 1948 is a <u>sign</u> that we are in the **end times**, and that the <u>hope</u> of Israel's *physical* and *spiritual* revival, as well as her salvation, are at hand.

Also, regarding <u>hope</u>, the <u>celebration</u> of **Feast of Sukkot** gives us a **little "taste"** of what it will be like in the <u>kingdom of God</u>. For in the **kingdom <u>Israel</u>**, and the people of <u>all</u> the nations, will bask in the **light** and **glory** of **God's goodness** and **gracious presence**. This will be a time characterized by <u>righteousness</u>, <u>peace</u> and <u>joy</u> in the **Spirit**.

...for the <u>kingdom of God</u> is **not eating** and **drinking**, but **righteousness** and **peace** and **joy** in the **Holy Spirit**. (Romans 14:17)

So as we **gather** in the **presence of God**, as we gather for **worship**, and the **celebration** of the **Feast of Sukkot**, as we **gather** and **fellowship** as a **sanctified**, **unified**, **loving body of believers**, as we **serve** one another, **encourage** one another, **pray** for one another, and as we **rejoice**, offer *spiritual* **sacrifices** of **thankfulness**, and **sing praise** to our **great God and Savior** under the **Sukkah**,

are we not *experiencing* a little **foretaste** of the **kingdom to come**?
