The **Bronze Serpent** and the **Cross**

The Messiah and the Pharisee

Now there was a man of the Pharisees, named **Nicodemus**, a *ruler* of the Jews; this man came to **Jesus** by **night** and said to **Him**, "**Rabbi**, we know that **You** have **come from God** *as* a **teacher**; for **no one** can do these **signs** that **You do** unless **God is** *with him*"...

Jesus answered and said to him,...

"As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up so that whoever believes will in Him have eternal life.

For **God so** *loved* **the world**, that **He gave** His **only begotten Son**, that whoever **believes in Him** shall **not perish**, but have **eternal life**. (John 3:1, 14-16)

The Bronze Serpent

Then they (Israel) set out from **Mount Hor** by the way of the Red Sea, to go around the land of **Edom**; and the **people** became *impatient* because of the **journey**.

The people spoke *against* God and Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is **no food** and water, and we loathe this miserable food."

The LORD sent <u>fiery serpents</u> among the **people** and they **bit the people**, so that **many** of the people of **Israel** *died*.

So the people came to **Moses** and said, "We have <u>sinned</u>, because we have <u>spoken against the LORD</u> and <u>you</u>; intercede with the LORD, that He may remove the serpents from us." And **Moses** interceded for the people.

Then **the LORD** said to **Moses**,

"Make a <u>fiery serpent</u>, and set it on a <u>standard</u>;
and it shall come about, that everyone who is **bitten**,
when he <u>looks at it</u>, he shall <u>live</u>."

And **Moses** made a **bronze** <u>serpent</u> and <u>set it</u> on the <u>standard</u>; and it came about, that if a <u>serpent</u> bit any man, when he **looked** to the <u>bronze</u> <u>serpent</u>, *he lived*. (Numbers 21:4-9)

The *Bronze Serpent* and the *Cross*—Comparisons/Observations

1. When the **people** came to **Moses** pleading for him to **intercede** and **deliver them** from the **deadly serpent bites**, **God** told **Moses** to *raise* a **bronze serpent** on a **standard**. Whoever was then **bitten**, if he *obediently* **looked at** and **beheld** the **serpent**, would then **live**. This was the one *means* by which they could be **healed** and **saved**.

When **God** sent **His only begotten Son** to be *raised* on the **cross**, **He commanded** that all men, **Jews** and **Gentiles**, would **need** to *look to* and **behold** <u>Him</u> who was *raised* on the <u>cross</u> as the *means* by which they could be <u>saved</u> and <u>healed</u> from the "sting" of death (I Cor. 15:56).

For this is the **will** of **My Father**, that everyone who **beholds the Son** and **believes in Him** will have **eternal life**, and **I Myself** will **raise him up** on the **last day**." (John 6:40)

...and **He Himself** bore our <u>sins</u> in **His body** on <u>the cross</u>, so that we might die to **sin** and live to **righteousness**; for by **His wounds** you **were healed**. (I Peter 2:24)

2. When God told Moses to *raise* a bronzed <u>serpent</u> on a standard, He symbolically "staked" to the standard the very <u>cause</u> of death among the Israelites.

When Jesus bore our <u>sins</u> in <u>His body</u> on the <u>cross</u>, He who "knew <u>no</u> sin" was *made* "<u>sin</u> on **our behalf**," and suffered **death**. God had "staked" to the cross and <u>condemned</u> the very <u>cause</u> of man's corruption and death, which is "<u>sin</u> in the <u>flesh</u>."

...and **He Himself bore our sins** in **His body** on **the cross**,..(I Peter 2:24a)

For what **the** *Law* could **not do,** *weak* as it was through the <u>flesh</u>, **God** *did*: sending **His own Son** in the *likeness* of <u>sinful flesh</u> and as an *offering* for sin, He <u>condemned sin</u> in the <u>flesh</u>, (Romans 8:3)

He made Him who knew <u>no</u> sin to be <u>sin</u> on our behalf, so that we might become the <u>righteousness</u> of God in Him. (II Cor.5:21)

3. When **God commanded Moses** to *raise* a **bronze serpent** as the *means* by which they could be **healed** from the **fatal stings** of the **fiery serpents**, **He** used the very *image* that **caused** <u>death</u>, the **serpent**, to <u>overcome</u> and <u>conquer</u> <u>death</u>.

When Jesus was *raised* on the **cross**, it was to **suffer** and **pay** the **penalty of <u>death</u>** for the <u>sins</u> of **mankind**. Three days later He would **overcome death** through His **resurrection**. As a **result**, the <u>cross</u> which *caused* <u>death</u>, became that which all men would <u>look to</u> and <u>embrace</u> to <u>overcome</u> the <u>power</u> and <u>plague</u> of our <u>greatest</u> enemy —death.

Therefore, since the **children share** in *flesh and blood*, **He Himself (Messiah)** likewise also **partook** of the **same**, that *through* <u>death</u> **He** might **render** *powerless* **him** who had the *power* of <u>death</u>, that is, the **devil**(that "old serpent)," and might free those who through fear of <u>death</u>

were subject to *slavery* all their lives. (Hebrews 2:14-15)

For the word of the <u>cross</u> is **foolishness** to those who are **perishing**, but to **us** who are **being** <u>saved</u> it is the <u>power</u> of God. (I Corinthians 1:18)

But when this **perishable** will have **put on** the **imperishable**, and this **mortal** will have **put on immortality**, then will come about the saying that is written,

"DEATH IS SWALLOWED UP IN VICTORY. O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR VICTORY?

O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR STING?"

The **sting** of **death** is **sin**, and the **power** of **sin** is the **law**; but **thanks** be **to God**, who gives us the **victory** through our **Lord Jesus the Messiah**. (I Corinthians 15:54-57)

4. When **Moses** *raised* the **serpent** on the **standard**, it was meant to be a **public display** that would *draw* those in **Israel**, who were *suffering* <u>death</u>, to "look upon it" and be **healed**. That which represented <u>judgment</u> and <u>death</u> (the **serpent**), was **publicly** *raised up* to be "looked upon" in faith by those who sought **healing** and **life**.

When **Jesus** was *raised* on the <u>cross</u> for the <u>suffering of death</u>, it was a <u>public</u> proclamation that the *price* of <u>redemption</u> had been <u>paid</u>, and that <u>our debt</u> of <u>sin</u> had been <u>forgiven</u>. The <u>cross</u> would be "looked upon," and <u>believed</u> by many throughout the ages, not only the *means* by which <u>men</u> can be <u>saved</u>, but as the <u>public</u> <u>manifestation</u> of <u>God's supreme love</u> and <u>righteousness</u>.

But now...the righteousness of God has been manifested,...

even the *righteousness* of God through <u>faith</u> in Jesus the Messiah for all those who <u>believe</u>;..

being <u>justified</u> as a **gift** by **His** <u>grace</u> through the <u>redemption</u> which is in **Messiah Jesus**; whom **God displayed** <u>publicly</u> as a <u>propitiation</u> in **His blood** through <u>faith</u>...(Romans 3:21-25a)

When **you** were **dead** in your **transgressions** and the **uncircumcision** of your **flesh**, **He** made you **alive together** *with* **Him**,

having **forgiven us** all our **transgressions**,

having **canceled out** the **certificate of <u>debt</u>** consisting of **decrees against us,** which was **hostile** to us; and **He** has taken it **out of the way**, having **(publicly) nailed it** to the **cross**. (Colossians 2:13-14)

Messiah <u>redeemed</u> us from the *curse* of the Law, having become a *curse* for us—for it is written, "Cursed IS EVERYONE WHO HANGS ON A TREE"—(Galatians 3:13)

5. When the **Israelites** "**looked upon**" the **bronze** <u>serpent</u> <u>raised</u> on a **standard**, they were **looking at** the very <u>instrument</u> that **God used** in <u>judgment</u> against them for their <u>complaining</u> and <u>rebellion</u>. It was a <u>reminder</u> of the <u>gravity</u> of their <u>sin</u>, and the <u>judgment</u> that was <u>inflicted</u> upon them (Num. 21:4-9).

When Jesus was *raised* on the <u>cross</u>, it was to <u>suffer death</u> and <u>pay the penalty</u> for the <u>sins</u> of <u>all men</u>. In every generation, as we "look to" the <u>cross</u> in <u>faith</u>, we are <u>reminded</u> that <u>God rendered judgment</u> upon <u>His beloved Son</u>, who <u>voluntarily "bore our <u>sins</u>," and <u>substituted</u> <u>His life</u>, that <u>we might receive redemption</u>, the <u>forgiveness</u> of <u>sins</u>, and <u>eternal life</u>.</u>

For God so <u>loved</u> the world, that He gave His only begotten Son,.. (John 3:16a)

this *Man* (Jesus), delivered over by the predetermined plan and foreknowledge of God, you nailed to a <u>cross</u> by the hands of godless men and put *Him* to *death*.

But God raised Him up again, putting an end to the agony of death, since it was impossible for Him to be held in its power. (Acts 2:23-24)

In Him (Messiah) we have <u>redemption</u> through His blood, the <u>forgiveness</u> of <u>our trespasses</u>, according to the <u>riches</u> of <u>His grace</u>. (Ephesians 1:7)

Closing Quote

"And here lies the **true interpretation** of what **Jesus** taught. If the **uplifted serpent**, as *symbol*, brought <u>life</u> to the *believing look* which was **fixed upon** the **giving, pardoning <u>love of God</u>**, then, in the **truest sense**, shall the **uplifted Son of Man** give **true** <u>life</u> to everyone that **believeth**, **looking up** *in Him* to the **giving** and **forgiving <u>love of God</u>**, which **His Son** came to *bring*, *declare*, and to *manifest*.

'For as **Moses** *lifted up* the **serpent** in the wilderness, so must the **Son of Man** be *lifted up*, that whoever <u>believeth</u> should **in Him** have **eternal life**.'''
