The Chanukah Story What is it all about, and what does it mean to me?

A. The Chanukah story is about resisting unrighteousness

During the cruel **reign** of **Antiochus IV** (approx. 165 B.C.), the **Jews** were *oppressed* **severely**, and *persecuted*. The **Temple** was **desecrated** and the **Jews** were being <u>forced</u> to accept **foreign culture** and **beliefs** that were **contrary to God**.

At this point they had **no choice** but to <u>resist</u>, and there arose a **small band** of **warriors** led by a family known as the **Maccabbees**. They waged a "miraculous" rebellion against **Antiochus**, and drove his "vastly superior" Syrian army out of Israel.

→ As *believers*, we too are called to *resist* unrighteousness:

You who **love the Lord**, <u>hate evil!</u>
He *preserves* the souls of His saints;
He *delivers* them out of the hand of the wicked. (Psalm 97:10)

Put on the **full <u>armor</u> of God**, so that you will be able to **stand firm** against the **schemes** of the **devil.**

For **our struggle** is not *against* **flesh and blood**, but against the **rulers**, against the **powers**, against the **world forces** of this **darkness**, against the **spiritual forces** of **wickedness** in the **heavenly places**. (Ephesians 6:11-12)

For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh, for the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh, but divinely powerful for the destruction of fortresses. We are destroying speculations and every lofty thing raised up against the knowledge of God,...
(Il Cor. 10:3-5a)

B. The **Chanukah story** is about *rejoicing* in an **amazing** <u>victory</u>.

We *rejoice* that a **small group** of **zealous Jews**, by **God's grace**, were able to **overcome** and **defeat** the **mighty Syrian army** of **Antiochus**. The **victory** over a **dreaded foe** makes **Chanukah** a time of **true joy** and **celebration**.

→ As *believers*, we too can *rejoice* in our <u>victory</u>, the victory we have in Messiah Yeshua, who delivered us from two *powerful* enemies—<u>sin</u> and <u>death</u>.

O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR VICTORY?
O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR STING?"

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law; but thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus the Messiah.

(I Corinthians 15:55-57)

C. The **Chanukah story** is about *rededication*— the **rededication** of the **Temple** and its **service** after it had been **desecrated** by the **evil Antiochus**.

"Now **Maccabeus** and his followers, the **Lord** leading them on, recovered the <u>Temple</u> and the city and they tore down the altars which had been built in the public square by the foreigners and also *destroyed* the sacred precincts.

They **purified** the **sanctuary** and made another **altar of sacrifice**...

It happened that on the **same day** on which the **sanctuary** had been **profaned** by the foreigners, the **purification** of the **sanctuary** took place, that is, on the **25th day of Kisley**.

They **celebrated** it for *eight days* with <u>rejoicing</u>,...

they offered hymns of **thanksgiving** to **Him** who had given **success** to the **purifying** of **His own holy place**.

They *decreed* by **public ordinance** and **vote** that the whole **nation** of the **Jews** should **observe** *these days* every year."

(The Second Book of Maccabees 1:1-9 and 10:1-8)

→ As **believers**, **we too** acknowledge the importance of <u>dedicating</u> and <u>consecrating</u> our "<u>temples</u>" (our **bodies**), in **service** to the **Lord**.

"Do you not know that <u>you</u> are a <u>temple of God</u> and *that* the **Spirit of God** dwells <u>in you</u>?"

(I Corinthians 3:16)

"Therefore, I urge you, brethren, by the *mercies* of God that you present your <u>bodies</u> a *living* and *holy* sacrifice, acceptable to God, *which* is your *spiritual* service of worship." (Romans 12:1)

- D. The **Chanukah story** is about the *retelling* of **God's** "miraculous" <u>provision</u>, and the <u>traditions</u> that have been embraced as a **result**:
 - 1. the **miraculous <u>victory</u>** of the **Jews** over a **superior enemy-**another historical **example** of **God's miraculous <u>preservation</u>** of the **Jews**
 - 2. the "miraculous" <u>8 days</u> of oil during the Temple's rededication
 - 3. the *traditions* of the **menorah**, the **special prayers**, **foods**, **gifts**, and **games**
 - → As **believers**, it is important for us to "**retell**" the **story**, **learn**, and even *celebrate* how **God** has been <u>faithful</u> to **His people**, and how **He** has **continually** <u>preserved</u> them according to **His promises**.

"For whatever was written in earlier times was written for our instruction, so that through perseverance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope." (Romans 15:4)

E. The Chanukah story *reveals* a prophetic "type" in the person of Antiochus (Daniel 8), a "type" of evil ruler who will come in the last days. This ruler is the anti-christ, who will seek to subjugate and <u>destroy</u> the people of God *prior* to his own destruction at the 2nd coming of Messiah.

"Therefore when you see the <u>ABOMINATION OF DESOLATION</u> which was spoken of through **Daniel the prophet** (Dan. 9:27), **standing** in the **holy place**...

then those who are in Judea must flee to the mountains...

For then will be a **great tribulation**, such as not occurred since the **beginning** of the world until now,..."

(Matthew 24:15-16, 21)

Let no one in any way deceive you, for *it will not come* unless the **apostasy** comes **first**, and the <u>man</u> of lawlessness is revealed, the <u>son</u> of destruction, who <u>opposes</u> and <u>exalts</u> himself above every so-called **god** or object of worship, so that **he** takes **his seat** in the <u>temple</u> displaying himself as **being God**. (II Thess. 2:3-4)
