## The <u>Call</u> of Moses (Pt. 2) (Exodus Ch. 4)

6. A Mounting Apprehension (4:1-17)

a. Moses' *Fear* of <u>Rejection</u> (4:1)

**4** Then **Moses** said, "What if they will <u>not</u> believe me or listen to what I say? For they may say, '**The LORD** has <u>not</u> appeared to you."

b. God's *Response*—Powerful <u>Signs</u> (4:2-9)

<sup>2</sup> The LORD said to him, "What is that in your hand?" And he said, "A staff."
 <sup>3</sup> Then He said, "Throw it on the ground." So he threw it on the ground, and it became a serpent; and Moses fled from it.

<sup>4</sup> But the LORD said to Moses,
"Stretch out your hand and grasp *it* by its tail"—so he stretched out his hand and caught it, and it became a *staff* in his hand—
<sup>5</sup> "that they may *believe* that the LORD, the God of their fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has *appeared* to you."

<sup>6</sup> The LORD furthermore said to him, "Now put your hand into your bosom." So he put his hand into his bosom, and when he took it out, behold, his hand was *leprous* like snow.

<sup>7</sup> Then **He said**, "Put **your hand** into your bosom again." So he put his hand into his bosom again, and when he took it out of his bosom, behold, **it was restored** like *the rest of* his flesh.

<sup>8</sup> "It shall come about that if they will not believe you or heed the witness of the first sign they may believe the witness of the last sign.
<sup>9</sup> But if they will not believe even these two signs or heed what you say, then you shall take some water from the Nile and pour it on the dry ground; and the water which you take from the Nile will become blood on the dry ground."

#### c. Moses' Fear of Inadequacy (4:10)

<sup>10</sup> Then Moses said to the LORD,
 "Please, Lord, I have never been <u>eloquent</u>, neither recently nor in time past, nor since You have spoken to Your servant; for I am *slow* of <u>speech</u> and *slow* of <u>tongue</u>."

#### d. God's Response—His Provision of Adequacy (4:11-12)

<sup>11</sup> The LORD said to him, "*Who* has made man's mouth? Or *who* makes *him* mute or deaf, or seeing or blind? Is it not <u>I</u>, the LORD?

<sup>12</sup> Now then **go**, and **I**, **even I**, will <u>be</u> with your <u>mouth</u>, and <u>teach you</u> what you are **to say**."

e. Moses' Continued Reluctance (4:13)

<sup>13</sup> But he said, "Please, Lord, now send the message by whomever You will."

#### f. God's *Response*—A Supportive <u>Helper</u> (4:14-17)

<sup>14</sup> Then the *anger* of the LORD burned against Moses, and He said, "Is there not your brother Aaron the Levite? I know that he speaks fluently.
And moreover, behold, he is *coming* out to meet you; when he sees you, he will be *glad* in his heart.

<sup>15</sup> You are to speak to him and put the words in his mouth; and I, even I, will be with your mouth and his mouth, and I will teach you what you are to do.

<sup>16</sup> Moreover, he shall <u>speak for you</u> to the people; and he will be as <u>a mouth</u> for you and you will be <u>as God</u> to him. <sup>17</sup> You shall take in your hand this staff, with which you shall perform the signs."

#### 7. A Mobilization towards Egypt (4:18-20)

<sup>18</sup> Then Moses departed and returned to Jethro his father-in-law and said to him, "Please, let me go, that I may <u>return</u> to my brethren who are in Egypt, and see if they are still alive." And Jethro said to Moses, "Go in peace."

<sup>19</sup> Now the LORD said to Moses in Midian,
 "<u>Go back</u> to Egypt, for all the men who were seeking your life are dead."
 <sup>20</sup> So Moses took his wife and his sons and mounted them on a donkey, and <u>returned</u> to the land of Egypt.
 Moses also took the staff of God in his hand.

8. A *Message* for <u>Pharaoh</u> (4:21-23)

<sup>21</sup> The LORD said to Moses, "When you go back to Egypt see that you perform before Pharaoh all the wonders which I have put in **your power**; but I will *harden* his heart so that he will <u>not</u> let the **people go**.

 <sup>22</sup> Then you shall <u>say</u> to Pharaoh, 'Thus says the LORD, "Israel is *My son*, My *firstborn*. <sup>23</sup> So I said to you,
 <u>'Let My son go</u> that he may serve Me'; but you have *refused* to let him go. Behold, I will <u>kill</u> your son, your firstborn.""

- 9. A *Mortal* Sin <u>Avoided</u> (4:24-26)
- 10. A *Merger* with <u>Aaron</u> (4:27-28)

<sup>27</sup> Now the LORD said to Aaron, "Go to meet Moses in the wilderness." So he went and <u>met him</u> at the mountain of God and *kissed* him.

<sup>28</sup> Moses told Aaron all the words of the LORD with which He had sent him, and all the signs that He had commanded him to do.

#### 11. A *Meeting* with the <u>People</u> (4:29-31)

<sup>29</sup> Then Moses and Aaron went and assembled all the elders of the sons of Israel; <sup>30</sup> and Aaron spoke all the words which the LORD had spoken to Moses. He then performed the signs in the sight of <u>the people</u>.

<sup>31</sup> So the people <u>believed</u>; and when they heard that the LORD was concerned about the sons of Israel and that He had seen their affliction, then they bowed low and <u>worshiped</u>.

## <u>Summary</u> Moses' *Fears*...God's **Response**

1. Moses' *Fear* → <u>Rejection</u>

"What if **they will <u>not</u> believe me** or **listen** to what **I say**?" For **they** may say, ' the **LORD** has <u>not appeared to you</u>." (4:1)

God's Response  $\rightarrow$  Assuring Moses with Powerful Signs (4:2-9) 2. Moses' *Fear*  $\rightarrow$  Inadequacy (4:10)

God's *Response*  $\rightarrow$  *Assuring* Moses that <u>He</u> will make him <u>Adequate</u> (4:12)

3. Moses' *continued* <u>Reluctance</u>→(4:13)

**God's** *Response*→*Assigning* to **Moses** his brother <u>Aaron</u> for <u>Support</u> (4:14-16)

"Is there not your <u>brother Aaron</u>...?...he speaks fluently...l, even l, will be <u>with</u> your mouth and *his* mouth,..." (4:14-16)

## Personal Application Overcoming our *Fears* in **Sharing** the <u>Gospel</u>

 Like Moses, we too can be fearful of being <u>rejected</u> as we seek to fulfill the 'Great Commission" calling to share the <u>gospel</u> in a hostile world. If so, we need to remember that, as with Moses, God has also given us two powerful <u>signs</u> to proclaim to the world, the <u>cross</u> and an <u>empty tomb</u>

For indeed Jews ask for <u>signs</u> and Greeks search for *wisdom*; but we *preach* Messiah <u>crucified</u> (and resurrected), to Jews a *stumbling block* and to Gentiles foolishness, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, <u>Messiah</u> the <u>power</u> of God and the <u>wisdom</u> of God. (I Corinthians 1:22-24)

2. Like **Moses**, *we too* may have <u>fears</u> of <u>inadequacy</u> as we attempt to be a **witness** of the **gospel** of **Messiah**. However, as with **Moses**, **God** has promised to be *our* <u>adequacy</u>.

When they bring you (my **disciples**) before the **synagogues** and the **rulers** and the **authorities**, do **not** worry about *how* or *what* you are **to speak** in your **defense**, or *what* you are **to say**; for the <u>Holy Spirit</u> will <u>teach you</u> in that very hour *what* you ought to say." (Luke 12:11-12)

Not that we are adequate *in ourselves..*, but *our* <u>adequacy</u> is from <u>God</u>, who also made us <u>adequate</u> as servants of a new covenant,... (II Corinthians 3:5-6a)

All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; so that the man of God may be <u>adequate</u>, <u>equipped</u> for every good work. (II Timothy 3:16-17)

3. Like **Moses**, *we too* may continue to **fear** and be **reluctant** to follow **God's calling** in our lives. As in the case of **Moses** and **Aaron**, **God** will **oftentimes** send us much needed **help** from <u>others</u>, who will come alongside, and give us **strength** and **encouragement** in our **ministry**.

For even when we had come into Macedonia **our flesh** had **no rest**, but we were **afflicted on every side**: <u>conflicts</u> *without*, <u>fears</u> *within*.

But **God**, who **comforts** the **depressed**, **comforted us** by the <u>coming of Titus</u>. (II Corinthians 7:5-6)
